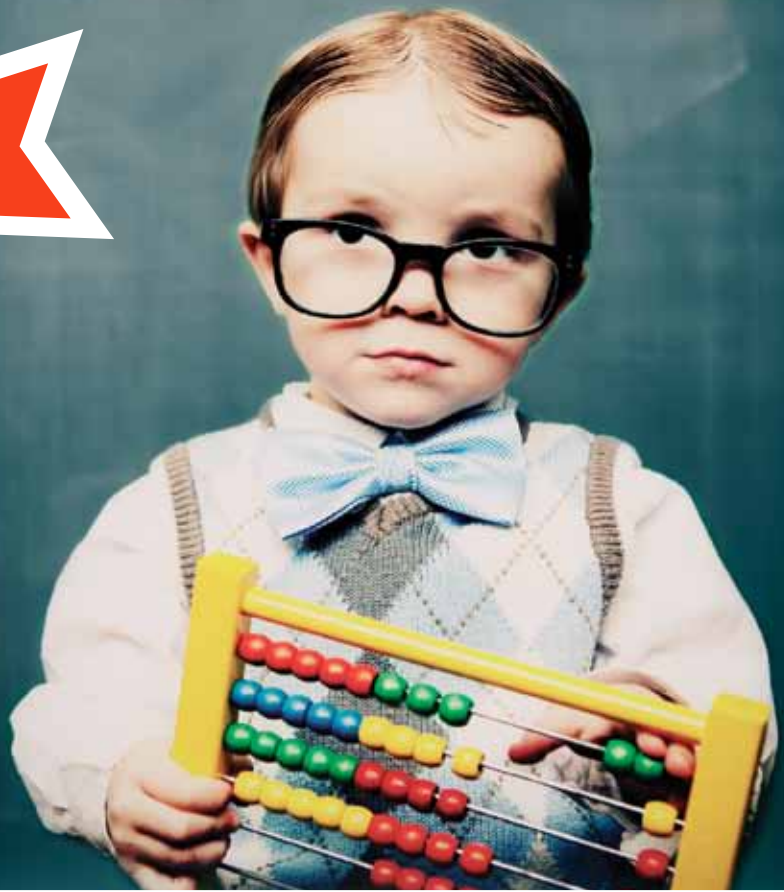

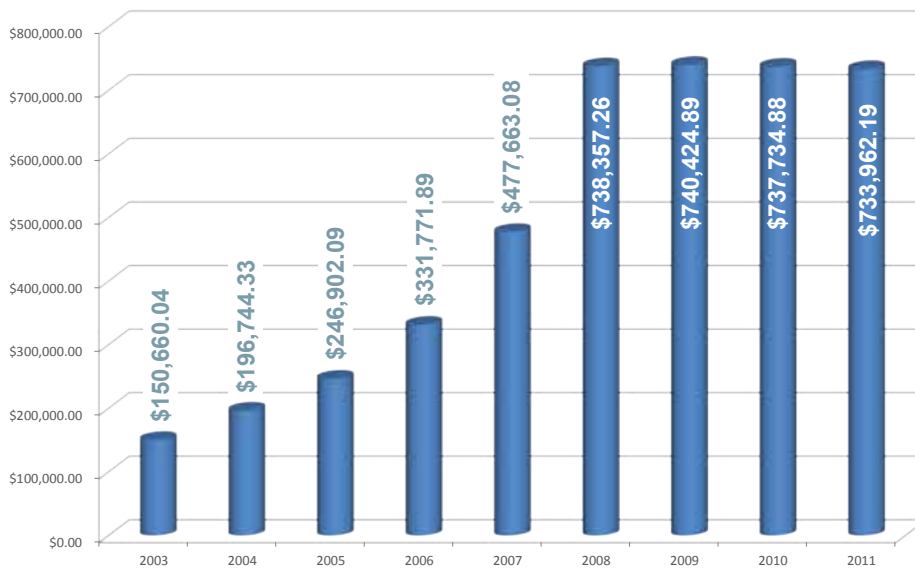


THE PASADENA ISD EDUCATION FOUNDATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS

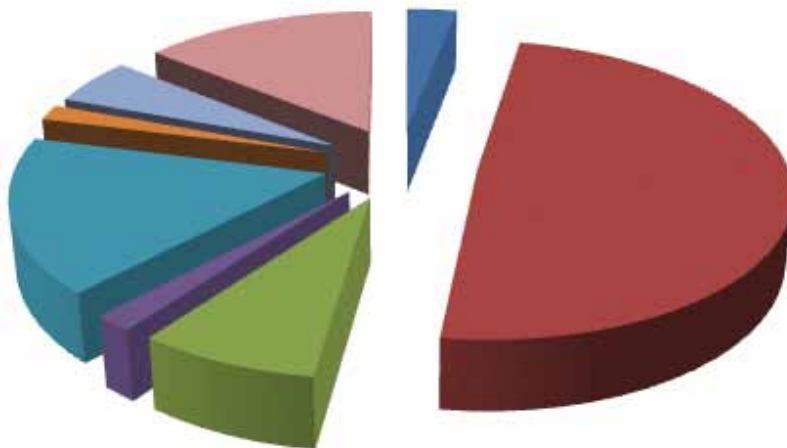

Loss of instruction time has been cut by 60%, because teaching conditions have so greatly improved. Funding has provided desks and adequate workspaces for 8 FTs to tutor students, conference with parents, and plan lessons.
